MacLellan ... John B. MacLellan is a student at Durham, boarding at 11 Highland Street, the home of F. Earl Thayer. (1929-31)

*** John A. MacLeod is a scale repairer for the railroad. John and Mamie A. MacLeod have a home at 35 Ammonoosuc Street. (1929-31)

*** Miss Shirley I. MacLeod is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at John MacLeod's at 35 Ammonoosuc Street. (1929-31)

MacMeekin ...

*** Donald C. MacMeekin is boarding at 40 Mill Street, the home of William J. MacMeekin. (1919) Donald is boarding at 25 Smith Street, the home of William J. MacMeekin. (1925)

*** William J. MacMeekin is a traveling salesman for the Grand Union Tea Company. He and Margaret E. MacMeekin live at 40 Mill Street. (1915)(1919)

*** William J. MacMeekin, Jr. is a mechanic at Clem Bailey's Woodsville Garage. he rooms at W. J. MacMeekin's on Mill Street (1915).

Mac s Dry Cleaners... Milton H. MacDonald, proprietor, at 19 Ammonoosuc Street. (1953 - 1959) Advertised as "Mac's Dry Cleaners & Toggery" in 1957, and offered Fur and Wool Storage. The phone # in 1957-1962 was 7-3701. Changed in 1963 to 747-3701.

*** George Magoon was the rector of Episcopal church. (1948-1952)

*** Harry L. Magoon is an agent for the B&M railroad. Harry and Margaret R. Magoon have a home at 37 Smith Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** Harry H. Magoon is a student at Plymouth Teacher's College and boarding at the home of Harry Magoon, 37 Smith Street. (1953 - 1955)

*** Paul H. Magoon is employed at 38-39 Railroad Street, Armour Wholesale meat Company, residing with Harry and Margaret Magoon, at 37 Smith Street. (1956 - 1958)

Maguire ...

*** Frank Maguire purchased Clark's Drug Store in 1916 and ran it as Woodsville Pharmacy. he closed the store at 83 Central Street, the Glover Building, in 1918 and removed to Springfiels, Vermont.

*** Miss Sheila Maguire is Librarian at Woodsville High School. 1967

MacFarlane ... John R. MacFarlane ire is a clerk at 83 Central Street in the Woodsville Pharmacy, owned by Mr. Spofford. (1919)

*** Frank A. Magwire is the proprietor of Woodsville Pharmacy, at 83 Central Street. He sold the business to Arthur Spofford in 1919.

Mahar ... Francis Mahar is an employee of the railroad, rooming at 79 Central Street, the home of Mrs. Alma D. Jackson. (1929-31)

Mahnker ... John Mahnker is a auto body worker at 61-63 Smith Street, Grafton Motors. John resides in Wells River, Vermont. (1956 - 1958)

Maloney ... Walter G. Maloney is a painter employed at 109 Central Street, George F. Stevens, house decorator. Walter rooms at 18 Maple Street, the home of Leonard Dodge. (1925)

Manchester ... Miss C. D. Manchester left McIndoes Falls in 1889 to open a millinery store in Woodsville. She kept a full line of millinery, fancy goods, patterns and publications, which she continually updated.

Mank ...Luvia Ellen Mann graduated from Woodsville High School in 1901. She attended Emerson School of Oratory, in Boston, and graduated in 1904. Luvia off-times worked with the Chataqua people that came in the summer to perform in a tent on the Community Field. The Chataqua people would board with many of the local residents. Luvia also worked for the White Entertainment Bureau. She married Almore Dexter Mank (6-4-1919). Almore Mank passed away on May 1st, 1922. Luvia married Bradley P. Smith on August 11th, 1927, resided in Woodsville until 1930 when they moved to 20 Felicia Road, Melrose, Mass. Luvia, born 4-1-1883 and died in February of 1943.

She had a good reputation as a reader and impersonator. Luvia married Almore Mank, a conductor on the B&M Railroad. Luvia, widow of Almore Mank, has a home at 61 Central Street. (1925)

Mann ...

*** Miss Ada A. Mann is a teacher at Woodsville Graded School. She rooms at Mrs. E. F. Mann's on Maple Street (1915). Ada is teaching in Lisbon in 1919 and boarding at 26 Maple Street, the home of Mrs. E. F. Mann. (1919)

*** Miss Edna H. Mann is a student at Plymouth Normal School, boarding at H. E. Mann's in North Haverhill and at 9 North Court Street, the home of Mrs. Lizzie U. Miller. (1929-31)

*** Miss Dorothy Mann removed to Lowell, Mass., prior to 1935.

*** Edward F. Mann was born on September 7th, 1845. Early in life Edward started a career with the railroad in passenger service. He later became a general superintendent.

*** Ezra Bartlett Mann (Ellen B.) is president of the Woodsville Aqueduct Co. (1915) (1919) E. B. Mann is treasurer Tip Top House Mt. Moosilauke, house on Court St. (1915)(1919) Ezra Bartlett Mann (1843-1922) left Benton (Coventry), in 1868, and came to Woodsville. He was born on November 2nd, 1843. Ezra worked for the railroad in his early years from 1863 until 1872. At that time he entered into business with George Cummings. Ai Willoughby joined them soon after. Cummings had built the Willoughby Block across So. Court Street from where the Opera Block would later be built.(1890)

The drug store name was changed to E.B. Mann & Company and moved across the street, in 1890, as soon as the Opera Block was finished. E. B. Mann & Company continued to become to longest running individually owned drug store in America.

Ezra was a trustee of the Opera Block and Woodsville Guaranty Savings Bank and was the postmaster in Woodsville 1885. He was a Mason, Odd Fellow, Elk, legislator, Democrat and Universalist. Ellen S. Mann, wife of Ezra B. Mann, died April 24th, 1922 and Ezra died August 7th, 1922.

There was a bicycle stand placed on the Ezra B. Mann residential property on Pleasant Street. It seems there have been a great many complaints that people were not able to view items in the store windows of the Weeks Block. And, it was very dangerous as some tried to step over the bikes and were lucky not to get tangled up and fall. This is to be considered a local safety improvement and it is proving to remedy the situation quite nicely. The stand was installed in May of 1942 and residence should thank the Mann's for their generosity and town spirit.

W. F. Witcher wrote of his conversation with EB Mann, in 1898, when Mann said that he (Mann) for a few weeks in the spring of 1864, performed the duties of station master, postmaster, express agent, attended to the round house, and acted as conductor on the freight train between Woodsville and Littleton!

*** E. B. Mann & Co. (Ezra B. and Ira W. Mann), deals in drugs, drain and sewer pipe, newspaper, paint, oils, dynamite, and periodicals in the Opera Block, Central and Court Streets from 1891 to 1974 when E. "Bart" Mann II sold the business to Harold "Ike" Wheeler. The business operated as E. B. Mann & Company in the Willoughby Block, across the street on So. Court Street from 1872 until it was moved to the newly constructed Opera Block, in 1891.

*** E. Bartlett (Bart) Mann, born July 28th, 1914. Bart was schooled at Woodsville High School, Phillips Exeter Academy and Norwich University. E. Bartlett boarded at 105 Central Street, the home of Ira W. Mann. He was a Captain in the National Guard. Bart and Marion Mann have a home at 16 Pine Street and one on Benton Road in North Haverhill. (1953 - 1955) Bart took over running E. B. Mann and Company until 1974 when it was sold to Harold Wheeler, a pharmacist in the store since 1963.

*** Mrs. Elnora F. Mann, widow of G. Henry Mann, has a home at 26 Maple Street. (1925 - 1937)

*** Miss Frances Mann is a student at St. Mary's in Concord and boarding at 16 Pine Street, the home of Ira W. Mann. (1929-31) Frances is still boarding in the Ira Mann home. (1935 - 1937)

*** Fred H. Mann is a traveling salesman. He and Daisy C. Mann room at Mrs. E. F. Mann's on Maple Street. (1915)(1919) Fred Henry Mann, born 7-6-1876, entered into the general store business, with his father, George Henry Mann, in 1900, in the Opera Block. Fred opened his own store, trading in candy, groceries and cameras at 119 Central Street, the Rowden Block in 1913. Fred retired in the 40's selling his store to Guy and Lorene Kelley. Mr. Mann had been in business about 40 years. Fred and Ina W. Mann have a home at 26 Maple Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** George E. Mann is an electrician at the Woodsville Aquaduct Company. He and Margaret S. Mann have a house at 18 Pine Street. (1915)(1919)(1925) George is foreman at the Water & Light Company. (1929 - 1937) The Manns' still live at 18 Pine Street. (1935 - 1937) George E. Mann passed away on January 23rd, 1951. Margaret resides at 18 Pine Street. (1956 - 1958) George Edward (Eddie) Mann was born (5-7-1874). In later years he became the Superintendent of the

Woodsville Aquaduct & Electric Company. George was a Democrat and Episcopalian. George retired from the Water & Light Company in 1950, after 60 years of service.

*** George E. Mann is office manager of First National Stores. George and Betty W. Mann have a home at 11 Smith Street. (1953 - 1955) George E. and Natalie C. Mann reside at 11 Smith Street. (1956 - 1958)

*** George Henry Mann, born 2-19-1848, entered into employment with the Boston, Concord and Montreal Railroad in 1869. He was a freight, cattle and passenger conductor. George left the railroad in 1901 to engage in business with his son Fred, as Mann & Mann, a general store, in the Opera Block, the end store on So. Court Street. This space became Scruggs Hardware in later years. Elinora F. Mann, widow of, G. Henry Mann, has a home at 26 Maple Street. (1925-31)

*** George W. Mann (1821-1901) was from Benton but had large real estate holdings in Woodsville. He was a Democrat and belonged to the Universalist Church.

*** Harley E. Mann was born (10-21-1883). He was a graduate of Woodsville High School and attended two years at Dartmouth. Harley was a career train dispatcher and a progressive Democrat. Harley E. Mann is a telephone operator & train inspector for the B&M railroad. He and Mattie A. Mann have a house on 19 Elm Street. (1915-1919) Harley has retired. He and Hattie have a home on River Road in North Haverhill. (1953 - 1955)

*** Harry Bingham Mann was born (4-22-1880). He was an engineer on the Boston & Maine Railroad, a Democrat, and a Mason. Harry and Lulu C. have a house on 18 Highland Street. (1915-1919) Harry is living at 61 Central Street in 1925.

Harry and Grace Mann have a home off Pleasant Street. (1929-31) Harry and Grace Mann now live at 34 Park Street. (1935 - 1958)

*** Henry Carbee Mann graduated from Clark University, in Worcester, Mass in 1907. Henry, born on July 21st, 1886, was a railroad employee, working in the engineers office of the B&M. He was a democrat. Henry and Sadie C. Mann have a home at 61 Central Street. (1925) Henry C. Mann (Taylor & Mann, Henry Mann and Harold O. Taylor, hardware and plumbing at 27 Central Street, in the Tilton Block. (1929-31) The Manns' have a residence at 16 Pine Street. (1935 - 1937) The Manns' have a residence at 29 Park Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** Henry and Melvin Mann were involved in a train wreck in Wentworth, NH, 12-11-1878, when a rainstorm softened the track bed. The two engines were the Franconia and the Moosilauke.

*** Henry C. Mann is a clerk at the E.B. Mann & Co. drug store in the Opera Block. He rooms at E. B. Mann's on Court St.(1915-1919) Henry and Joyce G. Mann have a home at 29 Park Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** Horace F. Mann came to Woodsville, in 1879, to become an employee of the railroad. Mr. Mann died at the age of 33.

*** Miss Ida Mann is teaching in Lisbon, NH. She boards at Mrs. E. F. Mann's at 26 Maple Street. (1919)

*** Ira Witcher Mann was born (1-8-1877). He was a pharmacist and was in partnership with his father E. B. Mann. Ira was a Democrat and belonged to the Episcopal Church. Ira and Josephine T. Mann have a house at 16 Pine Street.

*** Miss Margaret B. Mann is a student at Keene Normal, boarding at 16 Pine Street, the home of Ira W. Mann. (1925)

*** Margaret W. Mann, widow of George E. Mann, has a home at 18 Pine Street. (1953 - 1955)

*** Miss Maud M. Mann boards at 36 Highland Street, the home of Melvin J. Mann Street. (1925-31)

*** Melvin J. Mann came into the service of the Boston, Concord and Montreal Railroad in 1877. Melvin, born 3-8-1856, became one of the oldest passenger conductors in service. Melvin Mann owns a house at 36 Highland Street. (1915)(1919)(1925-31) Melvin's wife Mary M. Mann, died on February 17th, 1927. Melvin is retired in his home at 36 Highland Street. (1935 - 1937) Melvin and Henry Mann were in a train wreck in Wentworth, NH, 12-11-1878, when a rainstorm softened the track bed. The two engines involved were the Franconia and the Moosilauke.

*** Orville H. Mann was born in 1883 and became an employee of the railroad. Orville is a telephone operator for the B&M railroad and owns a house in Wells River (1915). Orville H. Mann is a car dispenser and operator for the railroad. Orville and Katie M. Mann have a home at 87 Central Street. (1925) Orville is a telegraph operator for the railroad. Orville and Katie M. *** Scott Witcher Mann graduated from Dartmouth College in 1908. Scott, born 12-9-1885, became a train dispatcher for the railroad in 1914. He later became a clerk at the National Bank of Newbury. Scott W. Mann operates the F. H. Mann Co. on Central Street. He and Mary M. Mann own a house at 17 Beech Street (1915). The Mann's are living at 26 1/2 Maple Street in 1919. Scott is an assistant cashier at Wells River Savings Bank in 1925. Scott and Mary M. Mann are still living at 26a Maple Street. (1925-31) Scott is cashier at the national Bank of Newbury and the Manns' are still living at 26a Maple Street. (1935 - 1958)

Maples ... Burt Maples is retired and living in the Sargent Block at 35 Central Street, room 19. (1953 - 1955)

Marcotti ... Carlo Marcotti is a clerk at C. Verganis fruit business in the Stahl Block (Laconia Savings Bank) on the corner of Central and Pleasant Streets. He

*** Harold L. Marden is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 41 North Court Street, the home of Lyman V. Marden, boarders. (1925) Harold is a student at Springfield College and boarding at 41 North Court Street. (1929-31) Harold is a salesman at People's Market, 15 North Court Street. Harold and Helen R. Mardin reside on Swiftwater Road. (1956 - 1958)

*** Lawrence G. Marden is in the U. S. Air Force. Lawrence and Lois J. Marden are boarding with Harold S. Locke, rfe #2. (1953 - 1955)

*** Lyman V. Marden is a freight handler for the railroad. Lyman and Cora E. Marden have a home at 41 North Court Street. (1925-31) Cora, widow of Lyman Mardin, has a home at 5 North Court Street. (1953 - 1958)

Margetts ...

*** Margaret Margetts is a student at Woodsville High School. She is boarding on Forest Street. (1919) Margaret Margetts removed to Brattleboro, Vermont, between 1919 and 1925)

*** William G. Margetts is a foreman of the Woodsville Extra Crew, B&M railroad. He and Emma S. Margetts have a house off Park Street. (1915) The Margetts have a house off Forest Street in 1919. The Margetts have removed to Boston, Mass. (1925)

Markham ...

*** Edward M. Markham is an agent for the American Express Company on Central Street. Edward rooms in Wells River, Vt. (1915) Edward is rooming at 35 Central Street in 1919.

*** Miss Ella Markham is a clerk in the Woodsville Post Office. She rooms at 35 Central Street. (1919)

*** John D. Markham is the chief train dispatcher for the B&M RR. His home is on Central Street. (1915). John is listed as deceased in 1919.

Marsh Construction Co. ... C. D. Marsh and Robert C. Sawyer, general contractors at 63 Central Street, rooms 1-2. (1929-31)

Marsh ...

*** Carleton D. Marsh is a civil engineer at H. P. Cummings Construction. Carleton and Florence N. Marsh have a house on King Street in 1915. The Marsh's are listed as having a house in Wells River in 1919. In 1925 Carleton is in business with Henry T. Rowe, as Rowe Construction Company, general contractors, 43 Central Street. The Marsh's are still living in Wells River, Vermont. (1925) Partners in Marsh Construction Co., 63 Central Street, and living at 11 Pine Street. (1929-31)

Carleton Marsh is vice-president of Cummings Construction Company. Carleton and Florence Marsh have a home at 11 Pine Street. (1935 - 1958)

*** John P. Marsh is a lineman in East Barnet, boarding at 97 Central Street, with Harold H. Crawford. (1929-31)

*** George E. Marshall is a trainman for the B&M railroad. George and Flora Marshall are living at 31 Highland Street. (1919)

*** Miss Margarita Marshall is a dressmaker, boarding at 18 Maple Street, the home of Nathan S. Knight. (1929-31)

*** Mrs. Ruth Marshall is teaching Home Economics at Woodsville High School, 1959-1963.

Marshall s General Store ... Mrs. Thera Marshall ran a general store in this house at #6 Terrace Street, in Stoneville. Terrace Street is just below Montebello Street and on the hill above Grafton Motors, on Rt. 302. Eva Wheeler rented the apartment over the store, for many years.

The store had been in business, by several previous owners, since the early 20's when it was owned by Briggs & Currier. Later owners were Mr. Gould, Ina Bisbee, F. H. Garneau, Leslie Hodgkins, Jerry Leonard and Henry Pelletier. The last person to run the store was Archie Strickland in 1953.

We moved to Woodsville, from North Haverhill, in 1943. I was christened in the North Haverhill Methodist Church. My mother, Bertha Hobbs, sent us, me and my brother Ozzie Lamarre, to church the first Sunday after we moved here. She told us how to get to church by going up Central Street toward the crossings, turn right and the church would be about four buildings down.

For some reason we went to church at different times. I went up Central Street a bit too far and ended up at the Universalist Church where I continued going for many years.

Ozzie didn't fare so well. He went a street farther than I and came home crying ... "I'll never go back to church. They don't even speak English in this new town!" Needless to say he had been to services in the Catholic Church.....

The membership very quickly increased to 130 and they were outgrowing their space in the Mount Gardner House, at the end of Main Street, by the bridge.

The lodge purchased the three story Tabor building on Pleasant Street and remodeled it for the lodge hall, offices and store rental spaces. The list of members included many outstanding citizens of Woodsville.

In 1890 a building was put up beside this one called the Odd Fellows Music Hall. It was a grand building with three stores on the ground floor, offices on the second floor and a large hall on the top floor.

On May 15th, 1901, a fire started in the livery stables behind the Music Hall. Both buildings were completely destroyed as well as the house and office of Dr. Dearborn. Dr. Dearborn then purchased Dr. E. M. Miller's house, by the graded school and St. Luke's, on School St. where he lived and maintained his medical practice.

*** Miss Avis Morse is a stenographer at Holbrook Grocery Company, 30 Railroad Street. Avis is rooming at 15 Elm Street, the home of James Beattie, livery. (1925)

*** E. B. Morse was a book seller in Woodsville. (1882)

*** Mrs. Emma F. Morse is boarding at 16 Beech Street, the home of George Stowbridge. (1925)

*** Fred B. Morse is a teller at Woodsville National Bank, rooming at 20 School Street, the home of George N, Spaulding. (1925)

*** George L. Morse, retired at 6 Elm Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** Mabel B. Morse, widow of Albert E. Morse is living in Woodsville. (1953 - 1955)

(1915-25) At 4 Gordon Place (1929-31) Clifford is farming and the Gordon's are still living at 4 Gordon Place. (1935 - 1937) The Moultons removed to Ludlow, Vermont, prior to 1956.

*** Miss Dorena M. Moulton is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 4 Gordon Place, the home of Clifford S. Moulton. (1929-31) Dorena is still boarding at 4 Gordon Place, the home of Clifford S. Moulton. (1935 - 1937)

*** Eva C. Moulton, widow of Herman Moulton, is residing at 12 Nelson Street. (1956 - 1958)

*** Hiram Moulton is a freight conductor on the B&M RR. He and Eva M. Moulton have a house on 171 Central Street. (1915)(1919) 167 Central Street. (1925) Hiram Moulton died in 1928.

*** Lloyd A. Moulton is a fireman on the railroad, rooming at 2 Chapel Street. (1925) Lloyd is a plumber. He and Gladys E. Moulton have a home at 8 Cherry Street. (1929-31) Lloyd is a plumber at 27 Central Street, Henry C. Mann, hardware and plumbing business. The Gordon's are boarding at 8 Gordon Place. (1935 - 1937) Lloyd and Hazel M. Moulton have a home at 12 Nelson Street. (1953 - 1958)

*** Richard L. Moulton is the minister at Jehovah's Witnesses. Richard and Ruth Moulton reside at 9 Perkins Place. (1956 - 1958)

Mount Gardner House... The Mount Gardner House was built at 11-13 Main (Central) Street, by John L. Davis, in 1875-76. It was the second hotel to be built in Woodsville, after the Parker House. Davis owned them both. In 1884 the business was sold to A. S. McLeod who hired Isaac George as his hotel manager. George had, previously, managed the Grafton County Farm. The Gardner House was very popular as a meeting place until its demise, by fire, in 1886. That October the Gardner House burned to the ground.

Mulliken ...

*** A. F. Mulliken & Son trades in hardware, paints and furnishings in the Mulliken Block on Central Street (1915). A. F. Mulliken 1852-1906.

*** Amelia B. Mulliken has removed to Athens, Georgia.

*** Earl F. Mulliken is the manager at A. T. Davis's Store in Wells River, Vermont. Earl and Gladys K. Mulliken have a house at 97 Central Street. (1919)

*** Ella M. Mulliken, widow of J. Frank Mulliken, has a home at 58 Smith Street. (1953 - 1955)

*** J. Frank Mulliken is a section hand for the B&M RR. Frank and Ella M. Mulliken have a house on South Court Street. (1915) Frank and Ella have a house at 58 Smith Street. (1919 - 1937) J. Frank Mulliken passed away on February 19th, 1952.

*** Martha M. Mulliken is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 57 Smith Street. (1919)

Mulliken Block ... The Mulliken Block, at 89-93 Central Street, was built in 1900. The building was located in the present parking area at the corner of Central and Chapel Streets. It was built by Adna F. Mulliken to be used as a hardware store. Mulliken was in the hardware business as Mulliken & Davis, in Wells River, Vermont, since 1875. Mulliken & Davis also operated in back of the original Odd Fellows building from 1883-1900. The building was to be two stories. The law office of Smith & Smith was to occupy space on the second floor and the Mulliken hardware store was to occupy the middle store on the ground floor. The store on the corner (the left side facing the building) was rented by Doe Brothers. Doe Brothers first sold overalls and work clothing, stable blankets and lap robes. In

1901 they started selling jewelry and watches. Soon later they started selling furs and Edison talking machines.

In 1901 an annex was added to the building. This was a two story wood framed building on the right of the original building. E. E. Craig moved his grocery business here in 1901 to 1906 when a fire broke out. It started on the second floor in the home and office of dentist H. G. Darling. The wooden annex was damaged, but the brick block was not. In 1907 James Lowe was contracted to move the remains of the wooden annex to the back and left, behind the brick Block. This later became Walker Motors building.

Mr. Mulliken immediately contracted to erect a brick building to replace the destroyed and moved annex. The main street store would be occupied by Doe Brothers. Doe Brothers soon sold the clothing part of their business to A. D. Farwell & Co. and moved their jewelry business to the back of the block, until they relocated in the Opera Block, Court Street side, in 1910. This space was previously occupied by the post office. E. E. Craig reopened his grocery store in the other side of the new annex. Craig store was sold to Richardson Brothers in 1909, to F. E. Cadwell 1911, to Lynn Miller in 1915.

In 1916 there was a fire in the original part of the Mulliken Block, on the corner. It was a horrible fire which destroyed the entire part in the original structure. The fire also spread to the annex and Lynn Miller's store. There was also damage to the building to the rear, the original annex that had been moved there earlier. The remains were removed and this area, to this day in 2009, is still a parking area. The annex building, which was recently damaged by fire from an adjacent building, now contains two businesses; "Everything but the cook" and Woodsville Book Store. There are apartments on the second floor. The remains of the annex, after the fire, were purchased by Alphonse Lorenzo. The building was restored and used for his shoe repair business. Lorenzo was from Italy. In 1921 he sold the building and returned to Italy. Ernest Gobeille purchased the building for his clothing and tailor business. He later moved the business upstairs into his apartment and rented the stores on the street level.

The original annex remains that were moved to the rear were then on Chapel Street. But when the original Mulliken block burned and became a parking lot the address became 93-97 Central Street. This building was first used as storage for Mulliken's hardware. Then in 1912 H. C. Hale had Ford cars displayed here. In 1914-1915 it became Bartlett-Mulliken Garage, selling Ford, Cadillac and Overland cars. A one story addition was built on the front of the building. Dana Wiggin, their mechanic, bought out the business in 1915. Wiggin moved to Haverhill, Mass., in 1920. The business then became Central Garage, H. D. Libbey, proprietor. In 1935 Libbey moved the business to "Stoneville" on the corner of Smith and Forest Streets. Walker & Eastman took over the garage; Packard, Dodge & Plymouth sales and repairs. J. Harvey Walker took over the business after the war and moved it to Route 10 in 1955. The business is operated by Jim Walker and his sons (2009).

Mulliken & Davis ... Mulliken & Davis had a plumbing shop on Pleasant Street until 1900 when they moved the business to the Mulliken Block at 89-93 Central Street. Their space was taken over by the New England & China Tea Company until 1901 when the building burned.

Mullen ... Norman H. Mullen, Principal of Woodsville High School, 1959-62. Formally Principal of Lisbon High School. In 1966, or before, Mr. Mullen became Superintendent of Schools after the retirement of Phil Bennett. Mrs. Marion Mullen teaches English and is the Librarian. 1966

Mundell ...

*** Harold F. Mundell is a truck driver for Ames Trucking Company. Harold and Katherine I. Mundell live on Brier Hill Road. (1953 - 1958)

*** Harold W. Mundell is a student at Haverhill Academy and boards with Harold and Katherine I. Mundell live on Brier Hill Road. (1953 - 1955) Harold is employed in Lincoln, NH, residing with Harold F. Mundell. (1956 - 1958)

Murrat ... Orrin Murrat is a freight handler for the B&M RR. He rooms at J.C. Pennocks on Mill Street (1915).

Music Hall, The ... The Odd Fellows Music Hall was built in 1890 on Pleasant Street, between the Odd Fellows Building and the Weeks Block. It had three stores on the street level and a public hall on the second floor that would seat 500 people. A shooting gallery moved into one of the first floor stores. They were previously in the Weeks Block.

Quincy Scott used one of the stores for storage. He had a store in the Weeks block, on the corner of Main and Pleasant Streets.

F. W. Whittier opened a bakery in 1892 in the third store on the first floor. He stayed until 1901 when the building was destroyed by fire. Whittier then moved to 15 North Court Street where he was, again, burned out. In 1906 he moved back into the new brick Odd Fellows Block.

Other businesses in the building were A. H. Vallee in a restaurant until he sold in 1893 to Charles W. Johnson.

I. K. George and his son Lewis rented the dining room in 1893. L. C. Lovejoy opened a meat market in 1896. Charles Newell operated a restaurant here in 1897. Elmer Brown ran the Music Hall Lunchroom in 1898. He later leased it to Mrs. Pronk. She gave up her lease when Newell sold the business to O. W. Gordon in 1899. Billy Newton opened a barber shop here in 1900 and H. H. Caswell opened a jewelry store.

The upstairs was used for many different kinds of entertainment. The building burned and was not replaced, in 1901.

Myott ... Lawrence Myott is a sectionhand for the railroad and boards at 13 Terrace Street, home of George A. LaFrance. (1919)
