*** Thomas Taylor is the chef at Hotel Wentworth, where he is boarding. (1935 - 1937) Thomas is manager of the Wentworth Hotel. Thomas and Bessie W. Taylor are boarding at the hotel. (1953 - 1955)

*** Thomas E. Taylor enlisted in the Signal Corps in 1864. He mustered out on 11-10-1865. Taylor, born on November 23rd, 1842.

He came to Haverhill in 1878 and farmed until 1882 when he entered service of the bridge building department of the B&M Railroad and removed to Woodsville, in 1894.

Taylor retired from the railroad in 1912. He was a Methodist, member of the Odd Fellows and a Republican in politics.

In 1915 he was doing carpentry work. Thomas is retired. He and Alice M. Taylor have a home at 14 Pine Street. (1919-31) Alice Taylor passed away prior to 1931.

the Tilton Block Annex. Paul was burned out of the Wentworth location in the early 1968 and moved next door into the basement of the Henderson Hotel. Paul remained there as most likely the oldest individually owned business in Woodsville until January of 2009, when pipes burst and his shop was flooded. He is now moving into a back space in the Shadow Box Art & Framing store, at 89-93 Central Street. Paul lives in North Haverhill.

***** Elmer H. Thayer purchased a lot on the corner of King and Smith Street, in 1897. He proceeded in putting up a building for storing grain, wagons and furniture. A few years later he was also selling coal. Around 1900 Thayer leased the upstairs to T. Jehu & Company. Jehu did carpentry, painting, papering and furniture repairing. Mr. Thayer moved into the former grist mill across Smith Street, in 1904, to be nearer the railroad tracks. In 1907 Mr. Thayer sold the King & Smith Street lumber and grain business and buildings to Luther Butler and C. H. Johnson. old his gristmill, wood and grain business in 1907.**

It was later called the "Red Mill". Elmer H. Thayer continued the coal, lime and cement business as Northern Supply Co. at 40 Central Street, near the first round house.

In 1908 Thayer sold the Northern Supply business to James Lowe. Lowe was famous as a builder and had a good reputation for moving buildings.

James Lowe sold the building to Mr. Bracy, the photographer from Wells River, and moved it across the street onto the lot where the Mt. Gardner House had burned in 1886. This building was originally built by John L. Davis in 1875-76.

It became Mr. Henderson's Palace Movie Theater, after being moved across the street to it's present location. The building was purchased by Charles Maccini in 1916 for the Woodsville Bowling Alley, operated by Andrew Bagonzi. Mr. and Mrs. Bagonzi later opened Bagonzi Restaurant, up the street in the Tilton Block annex.

Tilton Block ... Tilton Block was finished, at 27-31 Central Street, Woodsville, New Hampshire, in 1897. Sidney Tilton, born 5-13-1884, became an experienced cement contractor and had paving contracts in Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont. His sidewalk and street paving business was well established in 1890.

Mr. Tilton also had large land tracts and a lumber business.

The interior of the Tilton block was accomplished by James Lowe, an experienced contractor, and house mover.

Many different and diverse businesses have occupied this building which is still active as a business block in 2008.

The restaurant was moved to the right side in 1954. On the left John Avila Barber, 1966 Bud and Jane Chases "Chases Beautyrama." Then Mrs. Nickerson's and now Carmin's. (2009)

Tip Top House ... The Tip Top House is a summer hotel on Mt. Moosilauke. Mr. E. B. Mann is the treasurer. (1915)(1919)

Tondreau and Lamarre Brickyard ... This brickyard was started by Ira Witcher, on the Ai Willoughby farm, on Mill Street, in 1886. The brickyard was leased to Tondreau and Lamarre. In 1900 the lease was up and Lamarre moved the brick works to the corner of the road to Monroe and the back road to Bath, near the covered bridge between Woodsville and Bath. It became E. M. Lamarre brickyard until 1922. It is said you can still dig in the field and hit bricks, to this day, 2009.

Towers ... Wright Towers is manager at 7 Forest Street, Eastern States Farmers Exchange. Wright and Alida Towers have a home at 45 Park Street. (1953 - 1958) Wright Towers opened an antique and used furniture business in the "Red Mill" in 1965.
